Artists sometimes put art outside or use the environment and natural materials to make artwork. This is called Land Art. Do some Land Art research. Perhaps look for Judy Chicago's work *Atmospheres* or a piece by Ugo Rondinone called red pink blue green yellow orange mountain.

How do these artworks make you feel? Why do you think the artists chose those particular colours?

What you will need

- Collected Natural Materials like Stones and Sticks
- Paint or Chalk

Create a brightly coloured sculpture out of collected natural materials. Using paint or chalk you can turn natural objects into contemporary artworks. Arrange your stones and/or sticks in a pattern or pile them on top of each other to create a standing sculpture. Does your artwork have a story or a hidden meaning? Who will you want to tell about the meaning of your art work?

Caring for ourselves, each other and our world is really important. Get creative at home with these habitatinspired activities by artist Isabella Carreras.

These activities use recycled or foraged materials and help us explore more about the environment, particularly the affect of climate change on our world's ecosystems*. Hopefully these ideas will inspire you to do other art activities too. What else can you make? Think about all the things that you would normally throw away; switch on your imagination and turn them into something amazing.

Think about giving something you make to someone as a gift. Or, why don't you share the instructions for these ideas with your friends so they can be creative too?

Ask an adult where you can work on your ideas and what to wear when you do, especially when working with messy materials like paint and glue.

Mini-Deserts

What do you know about deserts?

Interestingly, there are four types of desert in the world and they're not all covered in sand! Why not get researching... what else can you find out?

For this activity we'll explore the hot, dry desert and create a mini installation. An installation is a type of 3D art; it's like an environment.

What you will need

- Cardboard Box
- Colourful Collage Scraps (think old wrapping paper, sweet wrappers, magazines)
- Glue
- Scissors
- Pens/Pencils

Cut away the top and one side of your box. Decorate the inside.

Switch on your artist persona; think about all the things that make your desert look intriguing; the colours, textures, shapes and stories. How can you make your installation seem hot and dry? Imagine what it might be like to stand amongst the sand dunes. What does the earth and the sky look like? What, or who, exists in your habitat? From your research you'll know about the different types of cacti, wildflowers, trees and grasses there. Tell stories with your landscape and add these to your installation. How will you make things look like they are close by or far away in the distance?

Psst...

Did you know that Antarctica is a desert? Cold deserts are still dry but have extremely low temperatures in comparison to other types of deserts.



Animal Inventions

Lots of artists make artwork about animals. This is a good way of helping people think about how we care for animals and their environments. Most of us will never experience living in a desert, so its environment feels unusual and different to what we're used to. Lots of people and animals make their homes there though.

Animals that live in the desert include scorpions, mountain lions, snakes, lizards, spiders, wolves, coyotes, foxes, ground squirrels, rabbits, falcons, ravens, desert tortoises, hawks, eagles, bobcats, sheep, deer, pronghorns, geckos, owls, bats, horned toads and more.

What you will need

- Pens/Pencils
- Paper

Can you draw all of these animals? If you don't know what they look like, why not make it up? Is it important that animals in artwork look like animals in real-life? You're the artist remember... you decide!

When you've finished, introduce these creatures into your desert installation.

Psst...

Not all drawings need to be on new paper; why not try re-using old paper that would otherwise be thrown away? Ask your family about old envelopes or other scrap paper that could become your new canvas.
